Dear Mayor and Members of the Council:

On Tuesday, December 4, 2018, bids were received for the above referenced project. The purpose of this letter is to summarize the bids received and provide the City with our recommendations for making an award on the project. A bid tabulation showing the results received has been prepared for the project and is enclosed for your reference.

The bid covers the sanitary sewer collection system rehabilitation, including slip-lining with cured in place pipe (CIPP), open cut sanitary sewer repair or replacement, manhole lining, and other methods, for the north half of the collection system. The bid also includes camera work for the south half of the collection system (i.e. beginning at F Street), as requested. An alternate bid was included to compare costs between open cutting of several existing sewer services, in lieu of trenchless methods, as recommended by one of the bidders during bid advertisement.

A total of two (2) bids were received for the project from Obrist and Company (Columbus, NE) and Midlands Construction (Kearney, NE), who also does work as Johnson Services. Johnson Services was the company that completed the previous video inspection of the north half of the collection system. The base bids ranged from \$1,074,540.00 to \$1,367,098.75. The lowest bid was provided by Midlands Construction. The deduct of \$3,125.00 for the alternate bid was small enough that it is recommended to proceed with trenchless installation methods for selected services, per the base bid.

All bids received were above the engineer's opinion of costs of \$1,070,000 for the project, but were within 0.5-percent of the low bidder. This Contractor is considered to be a responsive bidder, so it is our recommendation that an award should be made to Midlands Construction in the amount of \$1,074,540.00 for the Base Bid. This option will minimize additional surface disruption As this project is to be funding by USDA-RD, it is recommended that the bids be accepted contingent upon approval by the funding agency.

ORDINANCE NO. 1299

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 909 – SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS, ARTICLE 6: SUBDIVISION DESIGN STANDARDS, SECTION 606 SIDEWALKS, 606.02 STANDARDS, BY AMENDING SECTION 606.02 A AND 606.02 C, TO COINCIDE WITH THE MUNICIPAL CODE; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPEAL OF ANY ORDINANCE OR RESOLUTION IN CONFLICT THEREWITH; TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE THEREOF; AND TO AUTHORIZE PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DAVID CITY, BUTLER COUNTY, NEBRASKA, THAT THE FOLLOWING SECTIONS OF SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS ORDINANCE NO. 909 BE AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

ARTICLE 6: SUBDIVISION DESIGN STANDARDS

SECTION 606 SIDEWALKS

606.01 GENERAL

Sidewalks shall be labeled upon the improvement plans and installed by the property owner (or City in the event of an assessment district) upon completion of construction on a lot by lot basis in every subdivision, except, where unusual conditions exist which eliminate the need for sidewalks, and an exception to eliminate all or a portion of the sidewalk construction requirement is recommended by the Planning Commission and approved by the City Council as part of the final plat approval process.

606.02 STANDARDS

Sidewalks shall be installed in all subdivisions regardless of the use of land in the subdivision and such sidewalks shall be installed according to the following standards:

- A. Along both sides of all streets within the subdivision, in which case the edge of the sidewalk farthest from the street shall be placed at 12 inches from the property line with the sidewalk being within said right-of-way. In no case shall new placements of fire hydrants, or any associated gate valves, be located where sidewalks are required.
- B. All sidewalks shall extend to the street pavement at all intersections and at mid-block crossing where appropriate and shall be equipped with handicap access ramps.
- C. In neighborhoods planned as cluster developments, adjusted sidewalk locations may be submitted for consideration by the Planning Commission. The purpose of which is to achieve the most efficient pedestrian circulation through, and to and from, the development.
- D. The Planning Commission may recommend modifications to and the City Council may modify the requirements of this Section, but only in instances where park, railroads, extreme topographical conditions or other unusual conditions, excluding use of the property, make sidewalk installation non-essential or unnecessary on both sides of the street. In any subdivisions under the jurisdiction of the City where lot sizes equal or exceed one acre and average lot frontages exceed two hundred (200) feet, the Planning Commission may recommend and the City Council may grant an exception to all or some of this sidewalk installation requirement.
- E. The minimum sidewalk width shall be four (4) feet on local, collector and minor arterial streets and five (5) feet on major arterial streets, provided however, that in multiple family residential developments and non-residential subdivisions said sidewalks shall

be of a width suitable for the anticipated pedestrian traffic, but not less than four (4) feet, as determined by the City Council.

This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after passage, approval and publication or posting as required by law.

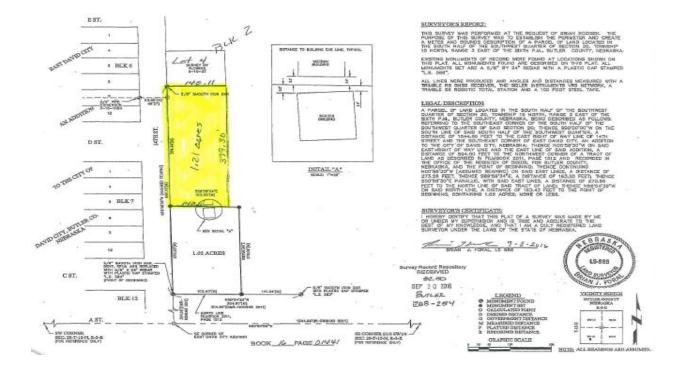

Council member Hotovy made a motion to approve the employees having off the morning of Monday, December 24th, 2018; saying it just makes sense. Council member Meysenburg seconded the motion. Voting AYE: Council members Smith, Kobus, Vandenberg, Meysenburg, and Hotovy. Voting NAY: Council member Trowbridge. The motion carried.

Mayor Zavodny declared a short three-minute recess at 8:10 p.m.

At 8:13 p.m. Mayor Zavodny reconvened the meeting stating the first order of business was to administer the Oath of Office to the newly elected Council members.

City Attorney Jim Egr gave the Oath of Office to re-elected Mayor Alan Zavodny and Council members: Thomas J. Kobus – 1st Ward; Kevin N. Hotovy – 2nd Ward; and John Vandenberg – 3rd Ward, and they were seated.

Present for the meeting were: Mayor Alan Zavodny, Council members Thomas Kobus, Dana Trowbridge, Patrick Meysenburg, Kevin Hotovy, Gary Smith, and John Vandenberg, City Attorney Jim Egr, and City Clerk Joan Kovar.

Mayor Zavodny stated the first order of business was to elect a council president for calendar years 2019 and 2020.

Council member Vandenberg nominated Council member Hotovy, Council member Trowbridge nominated Council member Smith, and Council member Kobus nominated Council member Trowbridge.

Council member Trowbridge made a motion that nominations cease. Council member Vandenberg seconded the motion. Voting AYE: Council members Smith, Kobus, Vandenberg, Hotovy, Trowbridge, and Meysenburg. Voting NAY: None. The motion carried.

Ballots were distributed to the Council members for the election of a council president. Mayor Zavodny appointed Council members Vandenberg and Meysenburg, and City Clerk Kovar to tally the votes. The result of the vote was given to Mayor Zavodny who announced that Council member Hotovy was elected as the Council President for calendar years 2019 and 2020.

Council members Smith and Trowbridge volunteered to serve on the Finance Committee.

Council member Hotovy introduced Ordinance No. 1300. Mayor Zavodny read Ordinance No. 1300 by title. Council member Hotovy made a motion to suspend the statutory rule that requires an Ordinance be read on three separate days. Council member Trowbridge seconded the motion. Voting AYE: Council members Smith, Kobus, Vandenberg, Meysenburg, Trowbridge, and Hotovy. Voting NAY: None. The motion carried.

Council member Hotovy made a motion to pass and adopt Ordinance No. 1300 on the third and final reading. Council member Vandenberg seconded the motion. Voting AYE: Council members Meysenburg, Smith, Kobus, Trowbridge, Hotovy, and Vandenberg. Voting NAY: None. The motion carried and Ordinance No. 1300 was passed on 3rd and final reading as follows:

ORDINANCE NO. 1300

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF DAVID CITY, NEBRASKA, TO AMEND CHAPTER 1 – ADMINISTRATIVE, ARTICLE 5 – MEETINGS, SECTION NO. 1 – 508 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING REGULAR MEETINGS OF THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS; TO PROVIDE FOR THE REPEAL OF ANY ORDINANCE OR RESOLUTION IN CONFLICT THEREWITH; TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE THEREOF; AND TO AUTHORIZE PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF DAVID CITY, BUTLER COUNTY, NEBRASKA:

SECTION 1. THAT THE FOLLOWING SECTION OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE BE AMENDED AS FOLLOWS:

Chapter 1 – Administrative

Article 5 – Meetings

§1 – 508 <u>MEETINGS; REGULAR MEETINGS</u>. The meetings of the Governing Body shall be held in the City Council meeting room of the City Office Building, 557 North 4th Street, David City, Nebraska. Regular meetings shall be held on the second (2nd) Wednesday and the fourth (4th) Wednesday of each month at the hour of seven (7:00) o'clock P.M.

At all meetings of the Council, a majority of the Council members shall constitute a quorum to do business.

SECTION 2. That any ordinance or section of any ordinance passed and approved prior to the passage, approval, and publication or posting of this ordinance and in conflict with its provisions, is hereby repealed.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be published in pamphlet form, shall be effective as of January 1, 2019, and shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, and publication as required by law.

Mayor Zavodny stated that R. J. Hein has requested that his property be annexed.

Council member Trowbridge introduced Ordinance No. 1301 annexing property owned by R.J. Hein Mayor Zavodny read Ordinance No. 1301 by title. Council member Hotovy made a motion to pass Ordinance No. 1301 on the **first reading only**. Council member Meysenburg seconded the motion. Voting AYE: Council members Trowbridge, Vandenberg, Smith, Kobus, Meysenburg, and Hotovy. Voting NAY: None. The motion carried and Ordinance No. 1301 was passed on 1st reading as follows:

ORDINANCE NO. 1301

AN ORDINANCE TO EXTEND THE BOUNDARIES AND INCLUDE WITHIN THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF, AND TO ANNEX TO, THE CITY OF DAVID CITY, NEBRASKA, PART OF THE NORTHWEST QUARTER (NW¼) OF SECTION EIGHTEEN (18), TOWNSHIP FIFTEEN (15), NORTH, RANGE THREE (3), EAST OF THE 6th P.M., BUTLER COUNTY, NEBRASKA; TO PROVIDE BENEFITS THERETO; TO PROVIDE FOR SEVERABILITY; TO CONFIRM ZONING CLASSIFICATION; TO REPEAL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE THEREOF; AND TO AUTHORIZE PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF. DAVID CITY, NEBRASKA:

SECTION 1. It is hereby found and determined by the Mayor and City Council that:

- (a) The tract of real estate described in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as if fully set forth is urban and suburban in character and contiguous and adjacent to the corporate limits of said City;
- (b) Police, fire, mad snow removal benefits will be immediately available thereto, and

City water service will be available as provided by law;

- (c) The Zoning classification of such territory as shown on the official zoning map of the City of David City, Nebraska, is hereby confirmed;
- (d) There is a unity of interest in the use of such territory with the use of lots, lands, streets, and highways in the City, and the community convenience and welfare and the interest of said City will be enhanced through incorporating such territory within the corporate limits of said City.

SECTION 2: That the boundaries of the City of David City, Nebraska, be and hereby are, extended to include within the corporate limits of said City the contiguous and adjacent territory described in Exhibit "A".

SECTION 3: That a certified copy of this Ordinance, together with the map of the territory, be filed on record in the Offices of the County Clerk of Butler County, Nebraska.

SECTION 4: That said territory is hereby annexed to the City of David City, Nebraska.

SECTION 5: Upon the taking effect of this Ordinance, the police, fire and snow removal services of said City shall be furnished to the territory herein annexed, and water service will be available as provided by law.

SECTION 6: If any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance or the annexation of the territory by this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or involved, such decision shall not affect the validity of the annexation of other tracts of land, streets or highways by this Ordinance, since it is the express intent of the Mayor and City Council to enact each section, subsection, clause or phrase separately and to annex each tract of land separately.

SECTION 7: All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 8: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.
